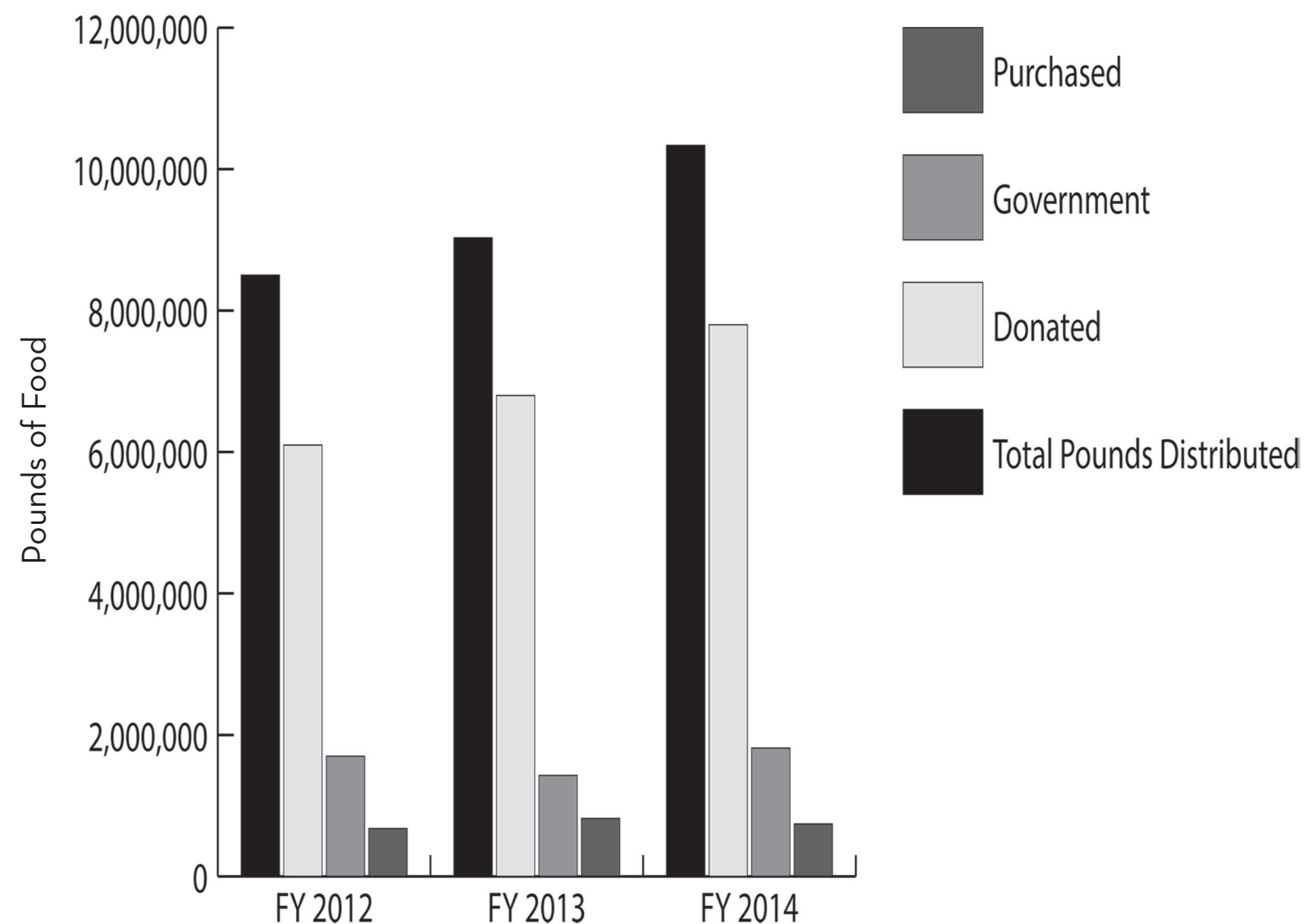

To collect donated food and grocery items from growers, manufacturers, processors, wholesalers and retailers for distribution to charitable agencies serving people in need.



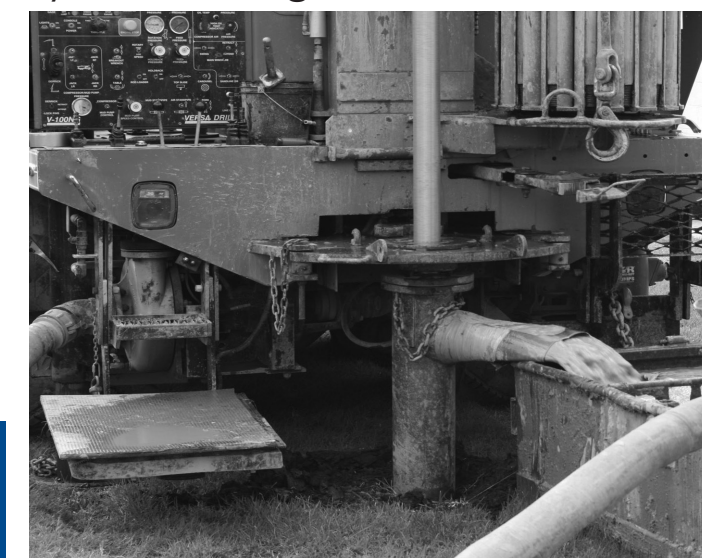

The Foodbank Goes Green

This fall work began on an estimated \$850,000 geothermal project that will help cut utility costs at the Foodbank's 56,000 square foot facility. The geothermal project will help heat and cool a portion of the building.

50 wells were dug 200 feet deep in the open lawn on the east side of the Foodbank's Cook Street location to install a closed loop geothermal heating and cooling system in the ground.

The system will use the earth as a heat source in the winter and a heat sink in the summer, resulting in significantly lower energy consumption.

"We want to put our resources towards feeding people in central Illinois, not towards paying utilities. The geothermal project will allow us to save on operating costs and put that savings towards food," said Central Illinois Foodbank executive director, Pam Molitoris.

This energy conservation project comes with a hefty price tag of nearly \$850,000, but \$750,000 of that amount is being funded through a consent decree settlement between Dominion and the US EPA involving Kincaid Power Station.

The first phase of the geothermal project is complete, and the system is heating the volunteer sort room.

Phase two will begin this spring - converting the rest of the offices to geothermal heating and cooling.

Rotary Donates Citrus

For the second year in a row the Rotary Club of Springfield offered the option during their annual citrus sale to purchase a \$20 box of citrus to be donated to Central Illinois Foodbank. In the first year the Foodbank received over 2,000 pounds of fresh citrus through the Rotary sale. This year 5,200 pounds of fresh oranges and grapefruit were donated. Last year we distributed 1.7 million pounds of fresh produce and are on track to surpass that in 2015.

Walmart Awards \$60,000 Grant

This fall Central Illinois Foodbank competed against 132 other food banks in Walmart's *Fight Hunger. Spark Change.* campaign. The social media campaign, which spanned from September 15th to October 5th, gave food banks a chance to win \$60,000 from Walmart if their food bank finished in the top 50 in online voting through the social media site Facebook. Central Illinois Foodbank received support from 21 counties and 150 agencies to garner enough votes to finish in the top 20 and receive one of the \$60,000 grants from Walmart.

In addition, three of the Foodbank's partners also benefitted from the award. Quincy Catholic Charities, Northeast Community Fund in Decatur and St. Martin Deporres in Springfield all received a \$5,000 credit at the Foodbank. The remainder of the money will go towards procuring fresh produce during the winter months.

Spotlight on Hunger

Jennifer Robinson is a married mother of four. Her husband works a full-time job, sometimes up to 60 hours a week to help ends meet for their family. With four kids and the rising cost of daycare, Jennifer stays home knowing that daycare would eat up her whole paycheck. "We are on food stamps, but only receive \$200 a month to feed our family of six, which doesn't last very long," said Robinson.

In 2013, Jennifer and her husband were struggling during the Christmas season. With no answer for their children when they asked what's for dinner, they turned to Two Rivers Pantry in Mt. Sterling and their Christmas basket program. The program provides families with the food they need to have a holiday meal together.

After receiving a Christmas basket from Two Rivers, Jennifer and her family started to visit the pantry when food ran low and money got tight. "Everybody hopes that they don't need it, but with four kids at home you just do what you have to do."

Jennifer's family is just one of the many families that utilize the services of one of our 150 agencies throughout our 21-county region.
